

Cleaning instructions

Cat quarantine kennels

1 Before entering the quarantine kennels

- Work from 'clean' to 'dirty'. So, start with the free-roaming kennels, and finish with the quarantine kennels.
- Put on shoe covers and overcoat
- Look at the board what personality the cat has

important

Before you start, check on the board which kennels you have to clean.

Is there food left in the bowl? Check with a caretaker if this is old or fresh food.

important

Always wash your hands, before and after cleaning the kennels. Use both soap and alcohol.

2 Cleaning the rooms

Clean room by room!

- Clean the floors, litterbox, waterbowls, scratching pole, and if needed change the towel.
- Use dish soap for cleaning the bowls.
- Replace the food bowl with a new one, if necessary.

3 The floor

- Start at the line near the door and work further into the kennel.
- Use the hair broom, dustpan and brush to dispose of the hair in the trash bin.
- Use the scrub brush and a soap solution of all-purpose cleaner and water, to clean the floors.
- Dry the floor with the squeegee. Remove the dirty water through the drain in the floor.

important

Use the right brush. One for food bowl and one for the litter box.

Empty the drain and clean it thoroughly. this helps to prevent clogs!

important

Let the disinfect solution sit for 20 minutes; only then will it effectively kill the germs.

4 Disinfecting the room and kennel

- Always start with the regular household cleaning.
- Disinfect the room with a solution of strong bleach and water (ratio 1:32).
- Sanitize the items in the room. Make a distinction between fabric items (toys, blankets, etc), plastic toys, and scratching posts.

5 Finished?

- Make sure to leave everything clean and tidy.
- Take off one shoe cover per foot and immediately step across the white line with your bare foot.
- Remove your coat and make sure you don't touch the outside surface.
- Throw both items in the trash bin inside the kennel
- Take the trash with you when you leave.
